



Drug Use Policy 2018

Aims

- A. To establish clear guidelines for the use of legal and prescription drugs, and the detection and reporting of illegal drug use, on school grounds and during school activities.

Scope

This policy applies to all members of the Association.

Definitions

- A. **Drugs** - For the purpose of this policy, we have separated drugs into three categories:
 1. Illegal drugs, eg, marijuana, heroin etc
 2. Drugs that are legal for adults but illegal for children, eg, tobacco and alcohol
 3. Over the counter and prescription drugs.

Principles

- A. Illegal drugs, eg marijuana, heroin, etc
 1. Possession or use of illegal drugs by members of the school community during any activity that is part of the school program is unacceptable and will lead to the involvement of WA Police.
 2. In the case of students found in the possession of illegal drugs, parents will be notified.
 3. Support and access to appropriate counselling services will be sought for students and their families when a student has been found in the possession of illegal drugs.
- B. Drugs that are legal for adults but illegal for children, eg, tobacco and alcohol
 1. No use of tobacco is acceptable by students at any time.
 2. There is no smoking allowed on the school grounds and adults will not smoke in the presence of children at any school activity.
 3. No use of alcohol is acceptable by students at any time.
 4. The Principal's discretion will be used to determine the acceptable use of alcohol by adults at school and during school activities in accordance with this policy.



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- a. Staff or supervising adults will not use, nor be under the influence of, alcohol at school or during any school activity.
- b. Adult members of the school community who are not supervising students may, on approved occasions, use alcohol providing this use does not result in inappropriate behaviour or offence to another member of the community.
- c. If a function is to be held at school, and the use of alcohol is considered desirable by the school community, the Principal may give permission for its use during the function, eg. during a quiz night. Regulations must be followed and a liquor licence applied for if applicable.

C. Over the counter and prescription drugs

1. Prescription drugs will only be used by the person the drug has been prescribed for, according to the instructions. Please see Administration of Medication Policy.
 - a. An exception to this is the use, in an emergency, of an epipen prescribed for one student, to treat another person for suspected anaphylactic shock. See Severe Allergies Policy.
2. Over the counter drugs, eg. Panadol and homeopathic remedies. Please see First Aid Policy.
 - a. These are used appropriately, under the supervision of staff and with the agreement of parents.
 - b. The abuse or unnecessary use of these kinds of drugs is not acceptable at school.

Responsibilities

A. Board

1. Monitoring and reviewing this policy as required.

B. Principal

Implementation of this policy in all aspects including:

1. Informing school community members of the content of this policy.
2. Managing instances of inappropriate drug use and medical emergencies related to drug use.
3. Supporting families involved in a drug related incident and referral to outside agencies.
4. Maintaining written records of suspected or known drug use or possession.



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B. Staff

1. Reporting incidents or suspicion of drug use or possession to Principal.
2. Complying with this policy.

C. Parent/Family

1. Parents should comply with the drug use policy at all times.
2. If there is a child at risk parents should endeavour to be open and work with the school and recommended support groups for a positive health outcome for the child.
